- Sufficient opportunities for Certified Student Affairs Educators (CSAEd) to obtain continuing education (CE) credits for their attendance at the AFA Annual Meeting, by evaluating program eligibility and alignment against the <u>Higher Education Consortium for Student Affairs Certification domains</u>
- Opportunities for presenters of diverse backgrounds and professional experiences to share expertise at the Annual Meeting
- Educational programming that aligns with high-need or high-priority areas, as outlined in the AFA Annual Meeting Content Focus Areas
- Educational programming best suited for in-person professional development that is not able to be shared as effectively through other program formats (in-person or virtual)
